Part 2: What is Existence?

Genesis 1:20-31 – the creation narrative day 5 and 6

We must remember that the narrative we read within the account of the Genesis was written after the fact, when Jehovah had enacted a covenant with Abraham to bring about the restoration of mankind through the promise. Moses was given the task of bringing the Torah to the people of Israel, since they had rejected his voice at Sinai.

Creation itself speaks to the Existence!
